Setting up We read The Little Red Hen by Paul Galdone multiple times last week and this week. For the retelling activity, I placed each different story element in its own glass bowl. The barley (the closest I could get to wheat seeds at the time), play dough and wheat stalks, flour, and play dough (for the cake). The characters were set next to the bowls, along with The Little Red Hen. What we did I called the children over to the table in groups of four, one for each character in the book. I explained that we were going to act out the story of the little red hen using the animals and the materials in the bowls.
