Throughout the long nineteenth century and until 1939, "intervention" (originally a French term) or "interference" (the original British term) was "Protean", covering an array of manifestations "from a speech in Parliament by Palmerston to the partition of Poland".¹ Not only was the scope of intervention wide, but its meaning and consequences remained contentious. The original just war doctrine was not concerned with intervening in other states for humanitarian reasons, but with providing just reasons for resorting to an inter-state war.
